





Any girl in grades K-12 can join the fun at Girl Scouts. Whether they want to be part of a troop, sign up for exciting series or events, explore the outdoors, or travel the world, each age level has something for every girl.



Camp



In-person events returned to all three camp properties during the 2021-2022 membership year: the Girl Zone, Camp Rocky Ledges and Camp Giscowhecho. More than 300 girls total attended day camps across the three camps. One of the most beloved events of the year, Camp Creepy, saw over 200 girls and adults in attendance. In total, 976 girls and 1,058 adults attended events at the combined properties, which doubled the previous year's total.

As part of Giving Tuesday 2021, more than \$3,000 in donations were solicited to secure an outdoor water supply for the Girl Zone which now allows Girl Scouts to enjoy sprinklers, slip & slides and more. Girl Scouts are able to enjoy the outdoors during the summer in a whole new way!





Cookies

The Girl Scout Cookie Program is such an important (and fun!) part of the overall Girl Scout experience—tons of learning for her and beyond-delicious cookies for our awesome cookie customers! It's a win-win. As cookie entrepreneurs, girls learn essential life skills like: goal setting, decision making, money management, people skills and business ethics. This year's program expanded the donation aspect. Donors stepped in, communities gathered, and Girl Scouts donated cookies to first-responders, healthcare workers, police, food banks and more.





What do troops do with their proceeds? Girl Scout proceeds stay local to:

- 1. Cover the costs of running the Girl Scout Cookie Program, including the costs of cookies, materials and logistics.
- 2. Fund Take Action project for the community and amazing girl-led adventures for troops.

With the Arts added to the mix, STEAM is everywhere and shapes our everyday experiences. Girl Scouting's highest awards—the Bronze, Silver, and Gold Awards—are a Girl Scout's chance to make a lasting difference in their community and in the world. Congratulations to all of the 2022 highest award recipients.

Gold Award

The Girl Scout Gold Award represents the highest achievement in Girl Scouting, open only to Seniors and Ambassadors. This prestigious award challenges girls to make a sustainable impact on their communities by solving community problems. Gold Award Girl Scouts are required to provide 80 hours of community service and are eligible for select scholarships as a result of earning the Gold Award. The awards program provides these young ladies with the opportunity to be an inspiration to other girls and serve as incredible examples of what it means to be a Girl Scout.

Silver Award

The Girl Scout Silver Award is the highest award that can be earned by a Girl Scout Cadette in grades 6-8. By earning this award, girls not only strengthen their skills and abilities, they learn about their community and take action to make the world a better place! This community-based project is a minimum of 50 hours. Congratulations to these go-getters!

Bronze Award

The Girl Scout Bronze Award is the highest award that can be earned by a Girl Scout Junior in grades 4-5. Earning this award shows that they have made a promise to help others, improve their community and become the best they can be. This community-based project is a minimum of 20 hours.

The Gold Award is the highest achievement in Girl Scouting. This prestigious honor is awarded to only 5.4% of eligible girls.



Emma Bauerbach

Whipple, OH


Emma's project "Digital Sign for Volunteer Fire Department" addressed the issue of improving outreach to the community for fire safety. With her project, the fire department will have ways to promote fire safety, as well as recruit new members. Through her door to door initiatives, flyers, digital sign and community newsletter, her goal is to help decrease fire calls by 10 percent and raise recruitment by 50 percent. She also hopes that her project will increase participation in community events and meetings.

Anna Brusoe

Morgantown, WV

Anna's project "N.E.W.S. – Narratives of Excellent Women in STEM" addresses the issue of girls, primarily those who live in rural areas or underrepresented minorities, being discouraged from exploring STEM due to a limited knowledge of women scientists and negative stereotypes. Anna wrote, illustrated and published a children's book about women scientists, which were given to elementary school teachers, librarians and educators in multiple states and rural areas. She also translated the book into Spanish, and shared copies with schools in Chile and Spanish speaking areas of Detroit, Michigan. Anna's hope for this book is to "combat negative stereotypes about minority scientists while also inspiring young girls through these amazing STEM role-models."





Vageesha Das

Morgantown, WV

Vageesha's project "Girls in STEM" addressed the issue of increasing girls' interest in STEM to the point where they think about a career in STEM. Vageesha discovered the root cause of her project was the lack of representation of women in STEM careers. To address this problem, she created videos about STEM topics and STEM careers. In total, Vageesha created 19 STEM topic videos and 8 STEM career videos. Vageesha uploaded her videos to YouTube so that her project can have a Global/National reach. She said, "My favorite part of the project was coming up with video topic ideas, creating the presentations, and recording the videos."

Lillian Floyd

Vienna, WV

Lillian's project "Little Leisure Libraries: Enabling Campers to Read!" addressed the issue of encouraging people to read. Her project gives children access to books from an early age so they are more likely to read more often and enjoy it. She also addresses the issue of providing adult opportunities to read more books for entertainment. Paige installed book lending libraries at local West Virginia state parks. To measure the impact that her project has had, she created a survey and placed a QR code at the libraries so that users can give their feedback. Paige said she is proud of her project and how successful it has been so far.

Erin's project "Beautifying Camp Kiashuta" addressed the issue of making a trail at the camp easier to navigate. She wanted to make the trail simpler for those who had never been on the trail, so she created and installed signs, as well as created a trail map. While working on her project, she noticed that the trail needed some cleaning up, she cleared the brush, limbs and other items from the trail. To inform others about her project, she hosted an event at the camp to show people the trail and took her sister Girl Scouts on the trail to show them the improvements. The committee of Camp Kiashuta were grateful for her project and are excited for more memories to be made on the trail.

Paige Messner

Wheeling, WV

Paige's project "Your Mental Health Matters. Talk About It!" addressed the importance of taking care of one's mental health. Through her project, Paige organized a Teen Mental First Aide Class for her peers, created a brochure to educate people on the importance of mental health, created a vinyl sticker for middle and high school students to make them aware of the new suicide hotline number, and planted a serenity garden to create a safe place to destress, think, pray or meditate. Through her project, Paige has decided she wants to go to college at WVU to study immunology and microbiology and research the connection between gut health and mental health.

Nola's project "Working Towards Working Less: how to actually be productive in a world focused on being 'busy'" addressed how young adults in high school can better prepare and respond to the pressures placed on them to engage in "hustle culture." Nola's project provided young adults with information on how to deal with these pressures and stressed the importance of rest and balance. By creating a presentation to share at her school and creating a social media account, Nola was able to reach more than 75 young adults. Nola says "I'm excited for future generations of students to be able to view my presentation, and I think it will remain relevant for years to come."

Raelyn Vance

Enterprise, WV

Raelyn's project Music for the Youth addressed the need to prepare elementary school band students for middle school band. Her project also addressed the issue of high school band students needing supplies left at home during band camp. Raelyn created a "step-up" clinic that will prepare students for the change to middle school band and installed a toolbox for high school band students who needed supplies during band camp. Raelyn said, "throughout this project, I have learned what it takes to be a leader."



Foster/Kinship Care

The Girl Scouts of Black Diamond is offering free programming for children in foster and kinship care as part of a Benedum Foundation grant. This grant aims to build youth resiliency through character-building programs in partnership with the West Virginia Council of Churches (WVCC) for the West Virginia Foster, Adoptive, and Kinship Parents Network (WVFAKPN). Girl Scouts is serving foster/kinship youth with meaningful programming and adult role models so that girls can become caring, productive adults.



Fun Patches

Fun patches are a way for girls to express their interests or share an activity that they participated in with their troop or on their own. Patches are given to Girl Scouts for participating in fun events, activities or other programs, whereas badges are awards girls earn by completing skill-building activities. Patches are worn on the back of vests or sashes, and badges are worn on the front.

Most Girl Scouts of Black Diamond patch programs have a main center-piece patch along with 12 additional patches or rockers that correspond with a monthly topic. Upon completion of a year's worth of activities, Girl Scouts will earn the whole set for their patch program. Other programs, like Get Outdoors, is based on seasonal activities and features leaves for each season.


