Why is it important for volunteers to be involved?

Use the power of relationships to our advantage! You know people in your local communities and have relationships with them.

Step 1 – Review the Girl Scouts of Black Diamond Council <u>sponsorships on our website</u>. Reach out to <u>Kelli Lewis</u> with the businesses you are interested in approaching to ensure that businesses are not being approached multiple times by different people. Kelli can also help you figure out what your ask amount should be.

Step 2 – Do a little research. Page 2 has some language about how powerful Girl Scouting is and there are some great flyers you can share.

Step 3 - A Girl Scout volunteer approaches a local business or individual about making a *first-time gift* to Girl Scouts of Black Diamond Council in support of one of the funding priorities we share with you or pledges their support for general operating costs. Step 3 - The business or individual <u>makes a gift</u> to Girl Scouts of Black Diamond Council. And we celebrate! Checks may be mailed to GSBDC, 321 Virginia Street West, Charleston, WV 25302

Step 4 - Once the gift is received, the local troop or service unit then receives 25% of the total gift to use to support programming for girls.
