# Song Leading A Skill That Can Be Learned

Love to sing, but not sure how to start teaching others? Here are some great guidelines for the emerging song leader—no matter what age you are.

# **Choosing Songs**

• Know the group that you will be working with. How old are they? How many girls are there? What are their singing abilities? What are their song interests? How long is their attention span?



- Begin with simple songs or songs that the girls know. Choose songs that are simple—short rounds, songs with tra-la-la choruses, repeat songs, or those that include repetition.
- Know what you are doing. Know the song words and the melody. Practice. Use note cards if you need them. Make a list of the songs you will sing, and know the order you will sing them in. Know something of the history of the song so you can share it with the girls.
- If you are choosing songs for an evening program, start out with the rowdy songs and end up with the quiet songs to set the tone for bedtime.

# **Leading Songs**

- Be enthusiastic.
- Sing the song through for the group. Introduce the song by telling where it is from. Sing the first verse and the chorus, so group members know how it sounds. Have those who know it sing with you.
- Teach the song phrase by phrase. Sing a phrase, and have the group sing back to you. Then join phrases and sing the verse and chorus. If long, teach a few verses, then repeat. Repeat once or twice.
- Sing the song all together. If singing a round, a song with parts, or a descant, make sure each group knows its part well before putting the parts together. If you are singing a song with parts, have a leader who knows each part. Use simple hand motions to keep the tempo.

# Song Leading A Skill That Can Be Learned

- You give the starting note. Hum the melody or use a musical instrument. If you get it wrong, stop and start over. Avoid pitching too high or too low for girls.
- Make sure that girls follow your hand motions. Let them know that hand motions are used to keep the group together in the right tempo, and the motions will help them know where you are in the song.
- Choose a variety of songs. Do songs that are fast and slow, songs that include hand motions, and songs that lend themselves to simple harmony, as well as funny songs. Avoid songs that might be offensive to religious or ethnic groups.



# **Skits**

A skit is a prepared, rehearsed presentation by part of the group for the enjoyment of the rest of the group. Practiced lines, costumes, sets and props are ingredients to a successful skit and sound preparation is a must. Skits are an excellent way for those who are shy to take part in a program.

Participants in the skit should be encouraged to speak loudly and clearly. Have them face the audience. Actions should be clear and distinct so that everyone can see and understand what is going on. Act as a coach or director, and screen the skit prior to the presentation. Provide hints and suggestions to make it a polished performance.

Try to avoid having the skit end before the audience understands what was happening. Stress the importance of having the punchline come through loud and clear, for the benefit of the audience. Use costumes and props whenever possible. These added touches make the audience even more appreciative of the work involved in the preparation.

After a while, published skits become old, so creative groups will want to develop new ideas on their own. One excellent way to develop a new skit is to act out a joke or cartoon that you find appealing. These can be found in magazines or gotten from friends. Skits can also be based on personal incidents—think of an amusing or embarrassing incident that occurred recently in your group and dramatize it. You can do a parody on yourselves or others engaged in their daily activities, adding enough exaggeration to make a successful skit. Hilarious impromptu skits can be fashioned around well-known fairy tales, such as Little Red Riding Hood, Hansel and Gretel, Goldilocks and the Three Bears, Rapunzel, etc. A few props and simple costumes make these even more fun. Try adding your own twists to the story, such as a surprise ending. Having an announcer simplifies things.

One method used to produce new skits is to assign a selection (combination) of settings, characters, and props. Here are some ideas:

Characters	Props
hippie	GS uniform
mountain woman	clothing
grandmother	basin or bucket
billy goat	jewelry
mouse	wig and purse
	hippie mountain woman grandmother billy goat

Now select one setting, two character, two props, and use them in a new skit or change and old one. Collect a large box of props to draw from, just old clothes and junk. You'd be surprised how useful some things are.

Encourage the girls to create their own original skits. In an activity prior to the presentation, provide the girls with the opportunity to write their own skits. Give them a setting, characters, as situation and props, and have them design a skit utilizing the se things. Encourage the use of good taste. Censorship or editing may be necessary!

Praise the performers for their efforts. A polished skit requires a great deal of time and effort, and appreciation should be shown

# **GIRL SCOUT LAW SKIT**

NARRATOR: In Girl Scouting we have one Law with ten parts.

I will do my best to be responsible for what I say and do (One or two girls enter carrying stuffed "pets", pretending that they are real. They are feeding, watering, brushing and walking them. They also talk to them lovingly.)

I will do my best to respect myself and others (Three girls enter, each holding a small hand mirror. Looking into the mirror, they say to themselves "I respect you, I respect you, I respect you". They then turn to each other and repeat the same thing.)

I will do my best to respect authority (Three girls and an older scout. The girls form a straight line. The older girl gives orders such as "About face" "Left face" "Right face". Each girl turns in opposite direction for general confusion)

I will do my best to use resources wisely (A Scout dressed VERY outlandishly such as purple socks, green skirt, red sweater, blue blouse, etc., with everything fitting very poorly.) She says: My mother sent me shopping, now wasn't that very nice I got all these lovely bargains at half their normal price

I will do my best to make the world a better place (Some girls enter with pet rocks and potted plants. One shows others the new house she just made for her pet rock. Others talk to their plants, etc.)

# **Funny Skits**

### The Lamp Post

around)

# Give the Frog a Loan

Required: 3 girls - a frog seeking a loan, Patty Wack the loan officer, Ms. Smith the bank manager.

Script:

Ms. Smith is offstage.

Patty Wack is seated at a desk.

The frog walks into the bank.

frog: Ribbit. Good morning.

patty: Good morning. (looks up and sees frog.) Oh my! Uh, my name is Patty Wack. How can I help you?

frog: Ms. Wack, I'd like to get a loan to buy a boat and go on a long vacation.

patty: (Takes a hard look at the frog, then shrugs her shoulders and gets out loan form. She starts filling in information) How much would you like to borrow?

frog: \$25,000 please.

patty: What is your name?

**frog**: Kim Jagger, I'm Mick Jagger's daughter, you know. My dad is good friends with your bank manager.

patty: Well, \$25,000 is quite a bit of money. We will need some collateral to secure the loan. What do you have?

frog: (holds up a small item) I have this Hummel!

Required: 4 to 8 girls

Script:

Girl #1 walks onstage and squats down as if she is sitting on a bench that is invisible.

Girl#1: Just sitting on this invisible bench.

Girl#2: Can I join you?

Girl #1: Sure.

Girl#2 sits down next to #1. Girl #3 repeats the dialog.

Each girl comes on and repeats, making a long line of girls sitting on the bench.

Last girl walks up to line of girls. last Girl: What are you guys doing?

all people: Just sitting here on this invisible bench.

last Girl: No you aren't. I moved the bench over there. (points)

All the sitting girls fall down.

Girl #1: But, I moved it back here this morning! last Girl: Oh, ok! (and sits down with the rest)

Add-On #2:
